New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum (NJQSAC) - Completed in August of 2022

The district was designated a "high-performing school district" during a thorough review by the New Jersey Department of Education. The evaluation is based on five areas: Instruction & Program, Fiscal, Governance, Operations, and Personnel.

College Board Honor Roll status for Rutherford High School

RHS met each of the following criteria for its students in the most recent graduating class; these criteria are anchored in research-based relationships between AP and college outcomes:

College Culture: 40% or more of the graduating cohort took at least one AP Exam during high school.

College Credit: 25% or more of the graduating cohort scored a 3 or higher on at least 1 AP Exam during high school.

College Optimization: 2% or more of the graduating cohort took 5 or more AP Exams during high school. At least 1 of those exams was taken in 9th or

10th grade, so that students are spreading their AP experience across grades rather than feeling disproportionate pressure in any single year.

Rutherford High School students' 2023 AP results

AP Scholars: 25 students

Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams

AP Scholars with Honors: 8 students

Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

AP Scholars with Distinction: 14 students

Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

Dual enrollment programs

Students earn college credits through programs offered through Fairleigh Dickinson University and Bergen Community College.

Recent college admissions

Students have been accepted at the following prestigious post-secondary institutions: Boston College, Brown University, Cornell University, College of William and Mary, George Washington University, Harvard University, Howard University, Oberlin College, Princeton University, University of Florida, University of Michigan, UNC Chapel Hill, University of Notre Dame, University of Virginia, Vassar College and Wake Forest University. Numerous students have been accepted to honors college and programs at various colleges and universities.

Two students in the past three years were accepted via direct admission to medical school out of the undergraduate programs at New Jersey Institute of Technology and University of the Sciences. They are guaranteed admission to medical school through these highly selective programs.

21st-century learning at Union Middle School

The Robotics/STEAM Team has placed in the top 1 percent of the world in the Vex Robotics World Championship every year since 2017.



The STEM club has won the majority of its competitions in New Jersey from Bridge Building, Drones, etc. Union is one of the first middle schools in the country to create a Drones class. Our Drones class will participate in upcoming competitions throughout the state. Union is also one of a few Middle Schools in the country to offer 20-plus electives, including Coding 101, 201, Architecture, Amusement Parks and Bridges, and Drama.

The library was converted into a "makerspace" where students can work on different technological and hands-on stations to disassemble, investigate and build various items. Furthermore, students utilize 3-D printers to boost analytical thinking, increase comprehension, and generate greater retention. Union School has three 3-D printers that are utilized throughout the school.

Union and Pierrepont Schools' Positive Behavioral Support in School (PBSIS) system

Implemented in partnership with The Boggs Center, Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports framework is associated with increases in positive student outcomes (e.g., increase in instructional time) and decreases conduct infractions as measured by office conduct referral and suspension data.

'Bulldog bucks" are used as an incentive for positive behavior choices. Whether a small behavior (e.g., holding the door) or a big behavior (e.g., helping a friend who is being bullied) Bulldog bucks can help us reinforce the kinds of behaviors we want to see.

Building foundations in elementary schools

The district begins developing students' academic, artistic and athletic skills, and passion for community service at an early age. Students have the opportunity to compete in local and county spelling bees, perform in choirs and plays, and have their artwork displayed throughout the borough. Last year, 10 students from Lincoln School had poems published in a national anthology ,Young American Poetry Digest. Pierrepont students had their artwork selected for the Bergen County calendar distributed to schools. At the K-Center, as well as Washington, LIncoln and Pierrepont, daily lessons, field trips, and special programs nurture future scholars.
