3. Read the following books:

- Ethan Frome by Edith Wharton (You should check this out of the RHS library.)
- *How to Read Literature Like a Professor: A Lively and Entertaining Guide to Reading Between the Lines,* Revised Edition by Thomas C. Foster (**You are on your own to get this book**.)
- A. In one document, summarize each chapter of Foster's book in 3-5 sentences. (This is a lot, so don't overdo it!)
 State the main point of each of his chapters. Keep it simple and in your own words.
- B. Read *Ethan Frome* and, in a second document, compose FIVE <u>one-page</u> mini essays in which you relate elements of *Ethan Frome* to FIVE of Foster's chapters. In each mini essay, analyze *Ethan Frome* using literary techniques you learned from a particular chapter of Foster's text. Discuss the application to *Ethen Frome* by using specific textual evidence from <u>both books</u> to support your interpretation. Quotes should be embedded properly and cited according to MLA style. Label each of the 5 mini-essays by the Title of Foster's chapters.

C. Prepare at least FIVE questions about *Ethan Frome*, with bullet-point responses, to be used during a Socratic Seminar on *Ethan Frome*, which we'll do within the first week of school. (Google Doc, HW grade, checked in class)
