#### INTRODUCTION

The English 100 curriculum is designed to develop the ability of each student to write critically, read analytically and to embrace critical thinking skills. A great deal of emphasis is placed on writing as a process and vocabulary enrichment.

The writing portion of the course focuses upon the basic rhetorical patterns of description, narration, example, classification, process analysis, comparison and contrast, definition, cause and effect, and argument. The writing portion of the course enforces the fact that writing is a practical art that can be learned by studying and applying these patterns.

The literature portion of the course focuses on the following concepts from both non-fiction and fiction texts: Cultures and Ethnicities, Gender, History, Home and Family, Humor and Satire, Language and Identity, Life and Death, Media, Memories of Youth, Morality and Ethics, Nature and the Environment, Overcoming Hardship and Disability, Public Policy, Science and Technology, School and Education, Sociology and Anthropology. Many of these concepts are aligned with the social studies grade 9 curriculum. The literature portion of the course will enhance students' knowledge of outstanding non-fiction and fiction texts. Students will be taught to analyze, synthesize, and predict aspects of the text. To encourage critical thinking, varied tools of learning will be incorporated. Technological materials including the use of the SMARTBoard, will be utilized. In addition students will be enriched by the incorporation of music, art, and current events that relate to the readings.

To accomplish proficiency in the language area, students will be given opportunities to incorporate vocabulary, study word choice, and effectively synthesize the writing process to convey their message. Throughout the course, students will be encouraged to use the concepts, themes, and activities to better comprehend themselves and their world. In addition, students will be preparing for state mandated standardized tests and the SAT.

The course fulfills the ninth grade requirement for English and adheres to the New Jersey Core Content State Standards for English Language Arts.
