Featuring Detective II Katie Feehan New Jersey State Police

Life in front of a screen is unavoidable, especially during the pandemic when many students are online for most of the day. There are risks and dangers that parents need to be aware of in order to protect their child from inappropriate content, breaches to online privacy, sexting, child predators and cyberbullying. In this 75-minute program, families will learn how to spot the dangers, how to protect their child

from malicious players, and how to respond to inappropriate content and cyber bullying.

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About our speaker:

Katie Feehan is a Detective in the New Jersey State Police's Internet Crimes Against Children Unit (ICACU) and serves as a member of the National Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Program (ICAC). She is responsible for investigating crimes that deal with the exploitation of children on the internet. These investigations include CyberTipline Reports referred from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC)

as well as proactive internet investigations using various platforms including peer to peer software, online ads, and undercover chat operations that target child predators online.

In addition to investigative work, Detective Feehan also serves as the ICAC Internet Safety Coordinator for the New Jersey State Police. In this role, she instructs students, parents and law enforcement officials throughout New Jersey about the dangers of internet use. Detective Feehan holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and a Master of Science in Criminal Justice both from New Jersey City University (NJCU).
